ABOUT FLICKA FRIENDS

This issue of Flicka Friends is dedicated to the emergency workers around the world who are risking their safety on a daily basis. Thanks to the others who continue to provide other vital services. Your skills and dedication are appreciated.

Flicka Friends is a newsletter that is written specifically for the people who own, crew aboard, or are interested in the Flicka, a twenty-foot sailing vessel designed by Bruce P. Bingham.

Based on the Newport Boats of Block Island Sound, this little yacht has been built from various materials from the 1970's until 2002. This includes Flickas constructed from plans obtained directly from Bruce's California office.

About 400 sets of plans were sold. According to Bruce Bingham, many Flickas can be found in New Zealand, Australia, and Sweden. Flickas continue to be built from plans to this day.

A number of hulls were built by Nor'Star and some were completed by Westerly Marine. The manufacturer of the bulk of the class is Pacific Seacraft who built 434 hulls in California.

The molds for the Flicka 20 have been acquired by <u>Oceancraft Sailboats</u> in North Carolina in 2014.

Flicka Friends has been published on a quarterly basis with issues being posted to the Internet in March, June, September and December. You can download the current issue as well as the back issues of Flicka Friends from the Flicka Home Page:

My thanks to the Flicka captains that sent in photos for the FF # 68, the April 2020 issue!







SEA MOUSE is my Pacific Seacraft Flicka and is hull # 5 and built in early 1978. This Flicka was bought as a kit in Oakland, California.

I've had **SEA MOUSE** since 2007, lived aboard and sailed extensively. My personal best was 212 days of sailing in 2012. I moved off 'da Mouse in 2017, but still sail at least two days a week on average, in any weather. Fine boat, it will be my last.

SEA MOUSE performs well in any wind with attention to reefing, and loves spinnaker runs.

I sail alone; so have worked out sail handling pretty good, for a 75-year-old! And, I sail engineless. A trolling motor is used for docking in tight spots and it works great.

I grew up when phone calls were a nickel, spent most of my life on boats, Navy for six years, commercial fishing for thirty years, and sailing since I was 15. Missed all that Internet stuff. No global positioning system. I still use my sextant offshore.







I bought the Flicka 20 last summer from a 91 yearold Swiss sailor. The boat was originally delivered from Los Angeles, CA to Germany in 1980. It has only been sailed on fresh water of Lake Constance in the summer months.












